University's Maiden convocation ceremony.

The President assured that "when completed, the comfort of the teachers and students would be strongly enhanced" and called upon staff and students to deploy these facilities appropriately.

The Visitor explained that Government expected that teachers must live above board by ensuring that those put in their custody were properly guided and protected. He reminded them that they have a responsibility towards those under their care.

He said that the level of unemployment in most economies of the world, had reached an "exponential proportion", observing that the Federal Government, as a response had initiated a number of youth-focused initiatives to tackle it and urged all young graduates to get deeply involved, with a view to becoming job-creators.

President Buhari stated that, that since ascension to office, his administration had realised the imminent destruction done to the nation's economy and the horrendous implication of corruption. Government, he said, had taken a number of measures to curtail corruption and urged Universities to join in the crusade against corruption.

This, according to him, could be

achieved by ensuring transparency in the execution of public procurements and contracts and by instituting accountable deployment of scarce resources.

The President said that his administration would continue to emphasise on the training and retraining of academic and non-academic staff, in addition to ensuring the periodic review of school curriculum in line with national goals and aspirations, as well as promote enterprise and entrepreneurial learning.

The Commander-in-Chief further stated that the task of rebuilding the nation was undoubtedly a collective responsibility of every Nigerian wherever they may find themselves-family, workplace, school-by being the light and a positive influence for the sustenance of the country's pride and Commonwealth.

He congratulated the His Royal

Highness, the Ona of Abaji on his appointment as the first Chancellor of the University, as well as the Pro-Chancellor and members of the Council, the Senate, Management and staff for their efforts and commitment and charged the graduands to use the knowledge and skills they have acquired for the betterment of themselves and for the supreme good of their fatherland.

In his message of goodwill, the Executive Secretary of NUC, Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, represented by the DIPR, Mallam Ibrahim U. Yakasai, congratulated the University on its Maiden Convocation and praised the leadership of the university "for taking the path of obedience to NUC regulations."

He expressed the Commission's dismay on the improper placement of staff and advised the Council and Management of the University to correct the anomaly forthwith.

The Executive Secretary disclosed that NUC would soon release the result of the recently conducted system-wide accreditation.

NUC, he said, was also worried about the number of uncompleted projects in the university and advised the new leadership to see how best to complete the structures.

Professor Kundiri also commended the Government and People of Taraba State, the host community particularly the Paramount Ruler, the Aku Uka of Wukari, His Royal Majesty, Dr. Shekarau Angyu Masa Ibi Kuvyon, *OON*; the T. Y. Danjuma Foundation among other numerous individuals and corporate organisations. Other highlights included the installation of the Ona of Abaji as the first Chancellor of the University, and the conferment of Honorary Doctorate Degrees of Letters to three imminent personalities, including the Chancellor; the Aku Uka of Wukari, Dr. Shekarau Angyu Masa, Ibi 11 and General T. Y. Danjuma (RTD), who was represented by Chief Obadia Andio, a former Minister of State for Water Resources. The best graduating student Aji David Adashu delivered a valedictory speech on behalf of all the graduands.

Proper management and timely availability of data would guarantee efficient and effective decision-making within the Nigerian University System (NUS), the Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, has said.

The Executive Secretary, who stated this when he received the new executives of the Committee of Registrars of Nigerian Universities (CORNU) in his office, recently, described them as critical stakeholders on which the universities relied for accurate records. He, therefore, challenged the Registrars to ensure that university Registries provide

accurate data, upon which the public and government could rely for information.

Professor Rasheed observed that whenever a Vice Chancellor and his Registrar work hand-in-hand, the university is the better for it. He, therefore, called on the Registrars to maintain a cordial working relationship with their Chief Executives (Vice Chancellors) for the overall benefit of the NUS. He advised the Committee to continue to strive for the best, adding that someday their labour would be rewarded.

The Executive Secretary promised the Association that the Commission would continue to support it to achieve its goals and objectives. He encouraged it to discuss issues that would lead to the growth of the NUS in its Annual General Conference, such as the repositioning of Postgraduate programmes and quality assurance. He informed the group that the Commission was in the process of unbundling the education landscape by introducing some new programmes, while it would also review the existing curriculum to address modern challenges.

Earlier, in his remarks, leader of the delegation and Registrar, University of Ilorin, Mr. E. D. Obafemi, who congratulated the Executive Secretary on his appointment last year, also thanked



him for NUC's support of the Association, especially with respect to the Commission's assistance towards the Association's attendance at international conferences. He expressed the Association's concern over the situation where a Registrar on CONTISS 15, on completing his/her five-year tenure and still in service, is made to revert to a Deputy Registrar cadre on CONTISS 14. He therefore appealed to the Commission to intervene in the matter by proffering a lasting solution to it. While informing the

Executive Secretary that the Association recently conducted elections of a new set of officials, he promised that Registrars, as partners in progress, would continue to work with other arms of the universities in the overall interest of the system.




Oil Company Canvasses Review of Engineering Curriculum

A two-man delegation from Total Exploration and Petrochemicals Nigeria Limited, led by the Executive General Manager, Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) Education, Engr Vincent Nnadi, last week visited the Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Raheed, mni, MFR, to canvass for the review of the Bachelor of Engineering curriculum in the Nigerian University System (NUS).

In his remarks, Engr Nnadi stated that Total had, in the course of building capacity of its young personnel, discovered some skillsgap in their training within the Nigerian universities. He observed that the skills-gap was not a case of incompetence on the part of the young graduates, whom, he acknowledged, were brilliant, but due to out-modelled curriculum, making them deficient in modern technology applications. He told the Executive Secretary that Total believed in the capacity of Nigerians and had been building this with more than 50 young professionals trained in the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), USA. He noted that the beauty of the programme was that a Nigerian academic in MIT, Professor Olawale Akinwande was one of those that mentored the young professionals.

The team leader said that the 50

professionals had returned home and were helping to develop the capacities of others, as they were also in touch with about 21 Faculties in the NUS. This achievement, he said, could not be going on without informing the NUC about it and seeking its involvement, especially in Total's quest to see that the curriculum is reviewed. He recalled the company held a conference on 31 January, 2017, where the 50 trainees showcased the benefits of what they had learnt. Total, he said, also has a programme it was currently running with MIT tagged, 'Empowering the Teachers', aimed at closing up the skills-gap identified in Nigeria.

Engineer Nnadi disclosed that no fewer than 200 Nigerians were currently receiving training in South Korea, Netherlands, China and Canada, with the hope that they would replace the expatriates, in line

with the Nigerian local content programme in the oil industry. MIT, he said, was known for its creativity. Total, therefore, had tried to mimic its curriculum for Science and Technology since itv was the best example for technology applications and for the fact that its products hardly looked for jobs because of the entrepreneurial components of its Engineering programme. The initiative, he stressed, was to ensure that Nigerian products were up-to-date with the changing technology.

Total, Engr Nnadi said, was at the Fellow's Conference of the Nigerian Society of Engineers (NSE), where it sought for more collaborations with other stakeholders. He disclosed that the company had adopted three universities (University of Port-Harcourt, University of Abuja



and the Lagos Business School) and was partnering with them to generate research for the oil industry. He observed that if other international oil companies took the same approach, the training of the much required critical mass of individuals that would cater for the oil industry would be achievable.

Responding, Professor Rasheed, described the efforts of the oil company as a very pleasant development. He thanked Total for its interest in the Nigerian higher education system and genuine concern for the state of the NUS and the NUC. He said that the company was doing well in terms of Research and Development, especially with its involvement in the Institute of Petroleum Studies domiciled at the University of Port Harcourt.

He expressed regret that most oil companies did not support Research and Development (R&D) in Nigerian universities.

The Executive Secretary thanked Total for recognising the fact that all curricula run in the NUS were under the auspices of the NUC. He, however, observed that a complete mimic of the curriculum of MIT was wrong and should not be completely adapted for the Nigerian environment.

He explained that curriculum review was at the prime of NUC's targets, especially with the concern it had attracted among stakeholders. To demonstrate its readiness, the Commission recently attended a British Council Conference on Higher Education where it canvassed for support on the review of the curriculum and the system. NUC, he said, was about to secure a grant from the DFID to reform the system.

Professor Rasheed, however, clarified that the current state of the curriculum hung at the door steps of the academics in the NUS. This, he said, was because all the curricula were developed by experts drawn from the system. With this in mind, he said that NUC should not be blamed when things go wrong. He informed the delegation that the Commission was working to ensure that the curriculum meets international standards. The Commission was also looking at those aspects of the curriculum that

was dynamic such as, the digital and genetic revolutions.

While correcting the notion that universities produce ready-made professionals, the Executive Secretary explained that all universities, including MIT, produce mainly those with academic qualifications, but with an eye to becoming professionals through exposure to workenvironment.

NUC and the universities, he said, must discourage uniformities in curriculum application and delivery. He acknowledged that Total Nigeria had shown enough goodwill and interest in its quest for curriculum review, with massive investment in higher education. He assured the team that the Commission was committed to the review of the curriculum and would take the view of the industry at the appropriate time.

Engr Nnadi was accompanies by the Manager, CSR Education, Mr. Azu Azuike, while some members of the NUC Management were also at the meeting.

Prof. Bamgbose Savours Life at 85

It was another one of those gatherings that question the education of those who care and remind them that one can never learn enough, that learning is indeed a life-long experience. The gathering where one interacts with and relishes the diction, grammar, anecdotes, content and all, of the remarks by eminent academics, people who had very good education and had been imparting same to many for many decades. It was the 85th birthday of the first Professor of Linguistics in Nigeria and perhaps, in Africa, Professor Emeritus Ayo Bamgbose, and launching of his autobiography, From Grass to Grace. The venue was the Trenchard Hall, University of Ibadan (UI) and the date, January 27, 2017.

It was a well-attended ceremony alright. As the Vice Chancellor of the University, Professor Idowu Olayinka rightly observed, it was "a gathering of who-is-who in Ibadan." Though, he was referring to the institution, one could add, "and beyond" because the Alake of Egbaland, HRM, Oba Michael Adedotun Gbadebo, Okekenu IV, who was in his final year in UI's Faculty of Arts, when the celebrant became a Professor, 49 years ago; was on the high table with his *Olori*, Dr. Tokunbo Gbadebo.

There were also Mr. Bisi Ogunleye, who was the celebrant's primary school pupil in Ilaro, Ogun State, in the mid1960s, and many other grand-mothers and grand-fathers, former pupils and students of his, including one from Uthman Dan

Fodio University, Sokoto, as well as his classmates at different levels of education, family and friends. People simply came from all walks of life to give honour to whom it was due, the man who has become the symbol of UI's Department of Linguistics and African Languages (formally Nigerian Languages).

The celebration was also that of the Nigerian Academy of Letters (NAL). Bamgbose, the first and, so far, only elected African Honorary Member of the Linguistic Society of America, since 1994, is NAL's Foundation President and a Fellow of the Academy. The members, therefore, came in their numbers: Professors Olu Obafemi (President), Dan Izevbaye (Book Reviewer), Benjamin Oloruntimehin, Akin Osuntokun, Funso Akere, Ben Elugbe, Abdulrasheed Na'Allah, Duro Adeleke, Francis Egbokhare, Lekan Oyeleye and Siyan Oyeweso, to name only a few. Also present

were eminent Professors Bimpe Aboyade (classmate of the celebrant), PAI Obayan, Olufemi Bamiro, Modupe Onadeko, among many others, while current and former Executive Secretaries of the NUC, Professors Abubakar Adamu Rasheed and Munzali Jibril were represented.

Special mention must be made of the celebrant's friend of 50 years, Professor Ayo Banjo who, as he admitted, had since become family. Banjo, the celebrant said, read the draft of the 222-paged book, wrote the forward and accepted to chair the ceremony. Chief Lekan Are, Chairman of University Press Limited, publishers of the book, aptly described Professors Bamgbose and Banjo as "Siamese twins that are not joined together." In his characteristic humility, Professor Banjo said, although those who knew his relationship

with the celebrant would have assumed that his role in the launch was a forgone conclusion, he did not take it for granted.

Drawing attention to a number of features of the career of the Foundation President of the Assembly of Academicians of the African Academy of Languages (ACALAN), which have made him stand out as a scholar and academic leader, Professor Banjo recalled how Bamgbose was one of the colleagues he met when he joined the Faculty of Arts, exactly 50 years ago. He was working on his Ph.D thesis then and recalled referring, in his own thesis, to Professor Bamgbose's earlier Ph.D thesis for the University of Edinburgh, Scotland, as apocalyptic. It was the first scientific study of the syntax of the Yoruba Language. The thesis was promptly published by the Cambridge University Press.

Professor Bamgbose went on to make equally sterling contributions to Yoruba phonology, working on Yoruba orthography and also led the linguists working on Yoruba metalanguage. The Alake of Egbaland was to later remark that "We owe you so much. What you have done for Yoruba Language is what Samuel Johnson (author of the Dictionary of the English Language) did for the English Language."

Professor Banjo added that, more recently, the first African President of the International Association of

World Englishes had been making profound contributions in the field of sociolinguistics, with particular reference to the language policy of multilingual countries with a foreign second and official language. In recognition of his contribution to scholarship, he was the sole recipient of the Nigerian National Order of Merit in 1990. In 2003, he was elected the second Vice-President of the Permanent International Committee of Linguists, the first time an African linguist was so honoured. He was also one of the outstanding Nigerian scholars inducted into the Hall of Fame for Letters by NAL, under the auspices of the Nigeria Liquefied Natural Gas (NLNG), in 2010

In a review that was rated as exceptional, academic and most intellectual by guests and the celebrant, Professor Dan Izevbaye, who turned 80 the week before, said, "The one underlying theme of Professor Emeritus Bamgbose's book is the insistence that the dignity of the individual and the

responsibility to speak out should not be compromised by material or financial gain. This principle recurs as a motif here and elsewhere in our national debate because it is vital for the health of a national culture."

According to him, the use to which Bamgbose puts the information about some of his experiences is often different from the expectations of the average reader of an autobiography, as we find in his evocation of three phases of his experiences in two major institutions that are central in his development - student life at St. Andrews College, Oyo, the undergraduate years at the University College, Ibadan and his academic and administrative experiences at the University of Ibadan.

"These memories", he said, "will not doubt trigger nostalgia in many of his former classmates and colleagues, although Bamgbose's ever alert critical mind constantly keeps pure nostalgia at arm's length. This information includes critiques of rules and procedures that regulate

and shape the future of another generation. The readers of the book will each have the opportunity to judge for themselves when they read it."

All the speakers, including Chief Lekan Are, Professor Olayinka, Foundation BA Linguistics, student of Bamgbose's, Professor Emeritus Ben Elugbe, who graduated in 1969; the Alake of Egba Land, the Chief Launcher and Maye Olubadan, Chief Adebayo Akande and Group Managing Director of Regency Alliance Insurance PLC, Mr. Biyi Otegbeye, had kind words for the celebrant: They commended his discipline, integrity, wisdom, humour, good human relations and for being active and inspirational in NAL, praying for longer life and good health for the man who still drives himself at 85.

Mr. Otegbeye presented the other side of Professor Bamgbose, which, in his words, proved that a life-time classroom professor could adapt to the boisterous world of corporate governance and politics. As the Pioneer Chairman Regency Alliance when it was incorporated in 1994, Bamgbose, he said, "eminently managed a Board filled with giants in their own rights: HRM Nnaemeka Achebe, the Obi of Onitsha; Retired Justice Adolphus Kabiri Whyte of the Supreme Court, Late Abubakar Koko, Bayo Adejumo, Chief, Mr. Biodun Adelakun etc. He presided over 13 Annual General Meetings, two extra-

ordinary General Meetings and 23 Board meetings in 13 years."

"Within months", Otegbeye added, "he became extremely versatile with corporate oversight activities such as, Budgeting, investment, Human Resource Management, Information Technology, Corporate governance, business ethics, etc." During his time, the company opened eight branches across the country, computerised all its operations, formed three subsidiaries and recapitalised from 10 million to 950 million in 2006 and also supervised the successful merger of four companies before handing over to the late Admiral Augustus Aikhomu in March 2007.

In a tribute shared with the *Monday Bulletin*, Professor Olu Obafemi stated that: "Emeritus Professor Ayo Bamgbose is one of the definers of

Linguistics studies in Nigeria, Africa and the world. He is indeed, suitably regarded as the Father of Nigerian Linguistics. To us, as our Foundation President, he has remained a permanent inspiration, path finder and leader. He is the spirit of NAL. Turning 85 and still so vibrant, versatile and agile tells us that with decent living and commitment to humanity, life is worth living in an enduring way. The memoir is a succinct, freeflowing and informative book about the challenges of life and how to survive them."

In another tribute shared with the *Monday Bulletin*, Professor Lekan Oyeleye of the Department of English, University of Ibadan, said, he got to know Professor Bamgbose in 1982, when he was to be his External Examiner, having concluded his thesis on English

Language at the University College, London in September, 1981 and submitted to the Department of English, Obafemi Awolowo University, Ile-Ife, which was in partnership with the University College, London. "He eventually came to examine me on June 21, 1985. I later joined the Department of English in 1987 and since then, he has been a consistent mentor, very good father and adviser. He has been a long standing partner of my other mentor, Professor Ayo Banjo, who brought me to UI. Always ready to assist us, anytime we have any research problem. When he turned 80, I had a chapter in the first script written in his honour, edited by Professor Kola Owolabi of my Department. When he clocked 85, I was privileged to be one of the writers of the blurbs of the Collection of his Essays and I said:

'very illuminating and insightful compendium, a testament to Professor Emeritus Ayo Bamgbose's sobriquet as a Prophet per excellence of African and Afro-Asian Linguistics.' I wish him longer life, continued service to humanity and the university community."

Responding to all the accolades and kind words, Professor Bamgbose stated that he decided to write the memoir to coincide with his 85th birthday for two reasons. NATIONAL UNIVERSITIES COMMISSION IPSAS IMPLEMENTATION



Introduction:

The Federal Executives Council at its meeting held on 28th July 2010 approved that Nigeria should adopt the provisions of the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) for Private and Public Sectors respectively.

Consequently, the Federation Accounts Standards Allocation Committee (FAAC) at its meeting held on 13th June 2011 setup a Sub-Committee to provide a roadmap for the implementation of IPSAS in the three tiers of government in NIgeria.

The Roadmap to the adoption of IPSAS was phased as follows:

- Full Adoption of IPSAS Cash effective from1st January, 2014.
- Adoption of IPSAS Accrual effective from 1st January 2016.

The National Universities Commission (NUC) has commenced the IPSAS implementation project that will enable a seamless adoption of the IPSAS accrual in the preparation and presentation of Financial Statements in line with the directives of Federation Accounts Allocation Committee (FAAC) Sub-Committee on implementation of IPSAS.

Implementation Approach:

NUC is partnering with Nexia Agbo Abel & Co, to adopt a phased implementation approach which shall focus on the following areas;

- Regulatory Compliance
- Technical Accounting & Reporting
- Knowledge & Resource Management
- Process, Technology & Infrastructure



Expected Benefits:

At the end of this implementation project, NUC's financial reporting is expected to be fully IPSAS accrual

compliant in line with the directive. This will ensure greater level of transparency, accountability and consistency in financial reporting just like similar Public Sector Entities (PSE), high-quality financial statements based on globally acceptable standards and audit efficiency.

IMPLEMENTING STEPS FOR NEW MEDICAL SCHOOLS, ACCREDITATION ISSUES AND THE NEW MINIMUM BENCHMARK (2015) FOR THE MBBS/BDS PROGRAMMES

PROGRAMMES

Following several Stakeholders' meetings in the last two years and as a prelude to the formal release of the New Minimum Academic Benchmark (2015), proprietors of Medical and Dental Schools in Nigeria (both current and prospective) are requested to note the following implementing steps including relevant adjustments relating to accreditation of Medical/Dental Schools.

- 1. From 1st September 2015, both current and prospective proprietors of Medical and Dental Schools should:
- a. Write a letter to the Executive Secretary stating their intent and provide relevant information as available.
- b. On receipt, (if NUC has no obvious reasons to disqualify the application), they would be sent a copy of the BMAS for MBBS/BDS and advised firmly to ensure that they are strictly complied with.



- c. The setting up of medical schools is not an emergency exercise. To this end, prospective proprietors must own and have in place (prior to a request for a Resource Verification), a fully functional and well run tertiary type hospital. In the circumstance of the above not being in place, consideration for an affiliation with a tertiary government-owned institution may be given only when the said university owns a medical institution fully functional with a minimum of 150 beds and a rural health medical unit. (See Appendix 4 of the BMAS).
- d. A Pre-clinical Accreditation would be expected to take place within two years of a positive Resource Verification. Students can only sit for the second MBBS professional examination (Anatomy, Physiology and Biochemistry) when they have a successful preclinical accreditation. The preclinical accreditation would, amongst others, concentrate largely on the Department of Anatomy, Biochemistry, Physiology, Pathology and Pharmacology and to a lesser extent, Community Health. All evaluated departments must have the minimum requirements in terms of academic staff, non academic staff and laboratory facilities. (See Appendix 3 of the BMAS)
- e. The Commission has now approved a Clinical Accreditation expected to take place within twelve months of a successful preclinical accreditation. Subsequent to that, a reaccreditation exercise will take place every five years.
- 2. With respect to established medical schools, (and irrespective of their accreditation status), it should be noted that only institutions that (by the deadline of March 20th, 2016) have requested and obtained formal approval from the National Universities Commission for a re-evaluation based on the following considerations would be allowed to admit students into the MBBS/BDS programmes from the 2016/2017 academic year:
- a. All Medical and Dental schools must have an approved, and appropriately utilized, Clinical Skills/Simulation centre.
- b. Ensure strict adherence to the proper use of the course system for all approved programmes in Nigerian Universities. The implication of the above is that a particular programme (subject) is taught not only broken into cluster units of 1-4 but also have the components of university supervised examinations. For clarity, current end of posting examinations (practiced by some medical/dental schools) that neither have units allocated nor follow the standards of a University examination, do not conform to the Minimum Academic Standards as established by the National Universities Commission.
- c. Universities are strongly urged to immediately review their current methods of teaching medical and dental students to include more tutorials, self study group teaching, use of IT in the delivery of courses and simulation/competency based evaluations that must be signed by a lecturer not below the status of a senior lecturer. It must be noted that the confirmation of a successful simulation/competency based evaluation should be a mandatory requirement before the students are eligible to sit for the various professional/sessional examinations
- 3. Proprietors are urged to note the Essential Component changes of the new curriculum expected to be in use from the 2016/2017 academic session. Details of these changes are available in the New Minimum Academic standards booklet and at the National Universities Commission website. (www.nuc.edu.ng.) Major components include the following:
- (a) The approval of three alternative models viz;
- i. A seven year MBBS/BDS programme that encompass a mandatory seamless four-year acquisition of the B.Sc. (Basic Medical Science) with interest in either Anatomy/Physiology/Biochemistry. At the end of seven years, students would have acquired the Bachelor of Basic Medical Science, Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery degrees. In case of the dental programmes, the students would have acquired a degree in Basic Dental Science and Bachelor of Dental Surgery.
- ii. In order to allow for career change for interested non-medical health professionals, the Commission has also approved a four year programme leading to MBBS/BDS for interested and qualified graduates of Nursing, Pharmacology, Physiotherapy, Image Science, Paramedics, Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry and Pharmacology. It must be noted for such to be considered for admission they must have at the WAEC/NECO levels minimum credit scores in Mathematics, English, Physics, Chemistry and Biology at one sitting, prior to the admissions for their first degrees. They must also have a good CGPA.
- iii. Admission into universities based on the current six year programme would be allowed to continue as suitable alternative based on the discretion of the University.
- iv. It should be noted and emphasized that all the above degrees have the Bachelor appellation as they remain undergraduate programmes.
- (b) Specific periods of posting to the department of Family Medicine. The obvious implication here is that, the Universities should create the Department of Family Medicine following their due process.
- (c) Redesignation of the Department of Pharmacology to the Department of Pharmacology and Therapeutics. The department is now expected to provide relevant basic clinical teaching and conduct relevant professional examination in Pharmacology. They will also be expected to provide relevant clinical teaching in Therapeutics. All Universities should set in motion the machinery to achieve the above.
- 4. In view of the above essential component changes of the new curriculum, the Commission will be organising a National training for Medical teachers in Nigerian Universities. Details of the training would be made available shortly.

As a follow up to this, the Commission vide a letter dated 14 January, 2013, sent a reminder to the universities requesting those that were yet to provide information on their Part-Time and Sandwich programmes as well as affiliation arrangements to do so on or before 15 February, 2013.

GUIDELINES ON PART-TIME AND SANDWICH PROGRAMMES IN NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES

Below are guidelines for conducting Part-time and Sandwich programmes in Nigerian universities. All universities currently operating Part-time programmes are expected to comply with the guidelines on programme by programme basis.

Consequently, universities still interested in running Part-time programmes are advised to forward fresh applications to the NUC on programme by programme basis.

This is, however, subject to the readiness of the university to comply with the following extant guidelines on part-time programmes:

- 1. The admission and graduation requirements, Staffing, Library and physical facilities requirements must be in line with the Benchmark Minimum Academic Standards (BMAS) for the various full-time academic programmes;
- 2. For a programme to be eligible to run on part-time basis, the approved full-time equivalent must be available in the university, must have earned full accreditation and must be run within approved campuses;
- 3. The enrolment into part-time programmes must not exceed 20% of total students' population in the programme;
- 4. The minimum duration of the part-time programmes must be 150% of the approved duration of the Full-Time equivalent;
- 5. Approval shall not be granted for part-time programmes in Environmental Sciences, Engineering/Technology, Law, Medicine/Medical Sciences, Pharmacy /Pharmaceutical Sciences, Dentistry; and Veterinary Science;
- 6. All admissions into part-time programmes must be through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Part-time programmes must be run within approved campuses of universities where the human and material resources for the teaching of the programmes are domiciled, i.e. on the main campus of the university;
- 7. Part-time programmes shall be subjected to the NUC accreditation assessment upon maturity of the programme;
- 8. For any programme to be eligible for part-time mode, it must have produced two (2) sets of graduates and satisfied the Resource Verification Requirements.
- 9. Commencement of a part-time programme MUST be subject to NUC's approval. Approval of commencement of all parttime programmes must be obtained.

The National Universities Commission shall not hesitate to apply appropriate sanctions on any university which violates any of the stipulated Guidelines on Part-Time and Sandwich Programmes.


