
We'll Consolidate Gains of NUS in 2018

he Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, mni, MFR, FNAL, has expressed profound appreciation to His Excellency, President Federal Republic of Nigeria, Muhammadu Buhari, GCFR, and all stakeholders in the education sector for the achievements recorded by the Commission in 2017 and commended the federal government for making education a top priority in the 2018 budget.

The NUC Scribe said he was ushering in the year 2018 with enthusiasm following the successful repositioning of the Nigerian University System (NUS) in 2017 for greater performance. He pledged his renewed commitment to the development of the NUS and the

In his New Year message, Professor Rasheed expressed optimism that 2018 would inspire hope for change for the better for the education sector, especially with the exit of the nation's economy out of recession, which challenged the overall implementation of the 2017 budget for all sectors.

He applauded the private sector for increased participation in university education, with the addition of six new institutions, bringing the total of private universities to 74 and expressed optimism that with the outcome of his interaction with vice-chancellors of Nigerian universities and their pledge to form greater synergy with the Commission, "2018 gives a renewed hope for the Nigerian University System (NUS)."

The Executive Secretary assured that as a quality assurance agency, quality would continue to

occupy the front burner in the operations of the Commission and charged all universities to, as expected from the fruits of the interaction, strengthen their internal quality assurance mechanisms by establishing a Directorate of Quality Assurance as a stand-alone, or alternatively ensure a strong Quality Assurance Unit in the Directorate of Academic Planning.

Professor Rasheed stated that the

Commission would, in the New Year, accelerate the comprehensive review of the entire university curricula (the Benchmark Minimum Academic Standards (BMAS) and ranking of Nigerian Universities. The other two cardinal activities of NUC, Accreditation of Programmes and Resource Verification, would also be conducted in universities where they are due in May and

November for Accreditation as well as March, July and December for Resource Verification.

The NUC, as directed by the Federal Government would also ensure the implementation of the outcome of the report of the Audit Committee inaugurated to review the projects executed in the twelve new federal universities in the country in line with its desire to ensure transparency and a c c o u n t a b i l i t y i n t h e management of public funds.

On research, Professor Rasheed said that, NUC would in 2018, strengthen its Research Directorate to work with those of the universities to coordinate research activities in universities and ensure relevance of their outputs. The Commission would also intensify efforts by challenging universities to develop and implement Institutional Research Policy and as matter of urgency, to establish a Research Administration

Directorate, headed by an academic not below the rank of a Professor, with appropriate human and material resources to run an Office of the Intellectual Property and Technology Transfer (OIPTT) or Office of Technology Commercialisation and Industry Relations (OTCIR). In recognition of the importance of data for proper planning and administration, NUC had resolved to resume from 2018, the Annual University Review Meeting (USARM) which was suspended in 2012. The Commission would also revamp Institutional Accreditation and commence accreditation of parttime programmes.

On delivery mode, the Executive Secretary stated that the Commission would continue to leverage on the use of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) to facilitate teaching, learning and research, while focusing more on student support services to ensure that university products were globally

competitive.

With the development of postgraduate BMAS, he said, NUC would also continue to carry out postgraduate accreditation exercises in line with the new timelines.

Professor Rasheed, who expressed satisfaction with the Commission's performance in the year under review, attributed the successes to the unparalleled support from the federal government, the Commission's workforce and the cooperation of Nigerian universities.

The Executive Secretary highlighted some of the achievements recorded in 2017 to include, accreditation of undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in Nigerian universities to ensure that standards were maintained, and access expanded.

The Commission undertook resource verification exercises to

newly approved programmes in universities and other newly established ones to ensure that the requisite manpower and material resources were in line with laid down academic standards.

Late in 2017, the Commission convened an all stakeholder summit which produced a draft National policy on Open Educational Resources (OER) for Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in Nigeria.

According to Professor Rasheed the draft policy which was

presented at the 2nd World OER Congress in Slovenia got wide acclaim.

Professor Rasheed further said that Nigerian universities were doing well based on empirical evidence in the African Centres of Excellence (ACE) Project of the World Bank and the outcome of the Accreditation exercises conducted on the various programmes at the Centres, the conduct of monitoring visits to private universities to assess their compliance with the terms of their license as well as the

establishment of more universities in the country.

The Executive Secretary, who expressed the hope that the Commission would achieve more in the current year, enjoined all stakeholders to continue to contribute meaningfully to the development of the NUS to take it to enviable heights.

He wished the NUS a successful 2018

PMB Advises Varsities to Collaborate with Foreign Counterparts

The President and Commanderin- Chief of the Armed Forces, Federal Republic of Nigeria and the Visitor to Federal University Ndufu-Alike Ikwo (FUNAI), His Excellency, President Muhammadu Buhari has advised Nigerian Universities to collaborate with their foreign counterparts in strategic academic areas.

He gave the advised in the Visitor's speech read on his behalf by the NUC Director, Management Support Services, Barr. Victor Onuoha, at the University's 2nd Convocation Ceremony held on December, 19th 2017.

President Buhari described 21st century as an era of partnership and collaboration and said that as a government, "we are building bridges of friendships with other like-minded nations in mutually rewarding areas in order to quicken our development and address common challenges. I, therefore, urge Nigerian Universities to take advantage of the goodwill our nation has with foreign governments and investors to partner international Universities and organisations in strategic academic areas. However, this must be done in accordance with the extant laws governing our nation".

The President congratulated the Chancellor of the University, HRM Oba Michael Adedotun Aremu Gbadebo, OFR, the Alake

and Paramount Ruler of Egbaland, for his fatherly role in guiding the affairs of the University. He appreciated the University Governing Council, under the leadership of the Pro-Chancellor and chairman, Prof. Mba Uzoukwu, as well as the Vice-Chancellor, Senate, Management, staff and students under the leadership of Prof. Chinedum Nwajiuba, for effectively piloting the day-today running of the University. According to him the young Nigerians being celebrated today represent the new hope of progress for the country, and would contribute meaningfully to the growth and development of our dear nation.

The Visitor stated that the

Federal Government, in its efforts towards providing the required conducive environment for teaching and learning, approved the sum of One Billion, Four Hundred and Ninety-eight Billion Naira (N1.498b) ecological fund to address the environmental and erosional challenges of the University. The intervention, made it possible for the University to have asphalted intra-campus roads since its inception, and also remedied some serious environmental challenges that could have hampered its infrastructural renaissance.

The President mentioned that the Federal Government will continue to do the right things until all Nigerians feel the impact





of the reforms through increased per capita income, improved living standard and employment opportunities, unrestricted access to quality education at all levels as well as accessible health care service delivery. The effort would be better achieved as the nation wriggles out of economic recession and through the Economic Recovery Growth Plan (ERGP).

President Muhammad Buhari enumerated giant strides made by his government to include; prudence in the management of public funds, embarked on economic diversification through massive investment in Agriculture and Solid Minerals and ensured zero tolerance to corruption and waste in order to guarantee a sustainable economic future for our citizens adding that, "Our N-Power programme is taking many youths out of the street while the policy on

fertilizer is making the input readily and directly available to farmers, eliminating the challenges of middlemen.

The School Feeding Programme, which had since commenced in many States, is making balanced meals available for our primary school pupils, thus improving their nutritional level."

He assured Nigerians of the commitment of the Federal Government to funding education at all levels and providing specific interventions at the tertiary level through Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) as well as the NEEDS Assessment projects. Universities have a critical role to play in our economic development through research and development, innovative ideas and empowerment of our youths with the right skill-sets

and functional knowledge to contribute meaningfully to national development. Universities must, therefore, as candles, continue to burn, to continue to shine light onto our darkness. More than ever before, the country needs the contributions of its intellectuals to achieve the desired accelerated national development.

The President reiterated that "we are committed to ridding our nation of terrorism and militancy as well as subduing the activities of criminals, under any guise, to ensure that our citizens are safe and secure in every part of the country irrespective of their ethnic and religious leanings. As a Government we will continue to do the needful to ensure that the country remains one, and safe for both domestic and international investors."

The President tasked the new graduates that today signal another new beginning in your journey through life that would determine, to a large extent, the degree of success in future, urging them to seize the available opportunities to excel in their chosen career.

The Chancellor, HRH Oba Michael Aremu Adedotun Gbadebo CFR in his address commenced by appreciating and welcoming the visitor to the university and President of the federal Republic of Nigeria, His Excellency President Muhammadu Buhari GCFR. He thanked God for healing his health and giving him a new lease of life and for the ecological

intervention project sited in the University stating that the project made the environment more conductive for academic work.

The Chancellor extended appreciation to his Excellency Engineer Dave Umachi, the Governor of Ebonyi State, for his assistance to the university whenever he was called upon. He thanked the governing council, senate and the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Chinedum Nwajiuba and his management team for the profound improvement in the infrastructure base of the university currently taking place and admonished the graduands to remain focused.

The Pro-Chancellor and Chairman, Governing council of the University, Professor Mba Uzoukwu, heartily welcomed the President and Commander-in-Chief of the Armed Force, Federal Republic of Nigeria, President Mahammadu Buhari, GCFR, all the dignitaries present and the graduands as well as parents and invited guests to the 2nd convocation of FUNAI.

Professor Uzouku reiterated the commitment of the University Council, to stick to the principles of excellence and integrity in the running of the affairs of FUNAI. He said "we shall continue to support the prompt promotion, training and retraining of our staff in modern teaching, learning and research as well as adopt administration technology in order to motivate them, make them relevant and capable of meeting the demands of the 21st century knowledge economy. We have been promoting the culture of selfless service, transparency, accountability and meritocracy with a view to support the university senate and management to produce highly knowledgeable, responsible and enterprising graduands who will impact positively on society."

Finally, he congratulated the graduands for meeting the requirements for the awards of a degree of the university and urged them not to forget the timeless principles on which they have been trained in the university, the principles of

excellence, integrity, hard work, responsibility and self-reliance. In his speech the Vice Chancellor, Professor Chinedum Uzoma Nwajiuba explained that the university graduated 247 from our faculties of Basic Medical Science-20, Humanities-92, Management, Social Science-47, and Sciences-88. Of the total, 22 emerged in the first class, 140 in the second class lower; and 5 in the third class.

The Vice Chancellor attributed that feat to a number of factors that included, students commitment to learning, undistracted by common vices plaguing some older universities, good laboratories and workshops, among others, attested by recent NUC accreditation report, as well as external Examiners' report.

Professor Nwajiuba welcomed the graduands and was glad that the University kept part of its bargain that whoever worked

hard and behaved well would be rewarded with a bachelor's degree certificate.

In an effort to make the University more responsive, the Vice-Chancellor informed the gathering that "Our University currently has a college of medicine and faculties of agriculture, education, engineering, humanities, management and social science. We have 54 undergraduate programmes. We are also commencing postgraduate studies shortly".

He specially thanked the NUC for its supervisory roles, direction and support and for approving College of Medicine and School of Postgraduate Studies, adding that FUNAI was encouraged by the Executive Secretary, NUC for his love and resolve to take the system forward.

The Vice-Chancellor lamented the challenges facing the University that included: "shortfall in salaries which has led to paying only 80 percent of salaries since February this year. Despite the 2017 appropriation act by which personnel approvals stood at N2,678,628,663 billion, representing monthly releases of N223,219,055,25 million, the a c t u a l r e l e a s e w a s N2,037,017,799.96. This means N169, 751, 483.33 million each, leaving a monthly shortfall of N53,467,571.92 million".

He was hopeful that as the year rolls to an end, the government will release this shortfall to empower the University to pay the outstanding 20% to the owed staff.

He seized the opportunity to thank the state governor, His Excellency, Engineer Dave Umahi for his gift to FUNAI staff (N2 Million) and student (1.5 million) at the maiden convocation last year, appreciating also the warm relationship with host

community.

The Vice-Chancellor drew the attention of the state governor to the incursion being faced by the former owners of the land in FUNAI Campus who were well remunerated by government early in the life of the University. He stated that "interference by land owners has become more serious, the latest being their resorting to legal action against the university. This is an urgent matter and our development is being hampered".

Professor Nwajiuba concluded by soliciting for contribution and support of everyone to contribute to her development, adding that the University's endowment committee would continue to reach out. The endowment would be used to build hostels, classrooms, office blocks, workshop, laboratories, vehicles, chairs, tables, stools, bookshelf, etc.

Prof. Okebukola Writes on Education in Nigeria in 2017 and Outlook for 2018

If we took Nigeria's educator sector for "health check-up" at the close of 2017, there are at least 45 indicators that can be reported on. Data inadequacies inhibit such comprehensive report, so we must pick from the menu, those indicators that we can conveniently derive some passable data. This check-up also shuns the tendency of focusing only on what the federal government does in the education sector leaving the over 80% of the sector that is constitutionally covered by state and local governments. It will highlight the success and failure stories of the sector in 2017 and telescope into expectations for 2018. We begin with the success stories.

Nationally, literacy rate (15 years and older) made slight gain from 67.3% to 68.1%; primary gross enrolment ratio also improved from 94.32% to 96.14%; secondary gross enrolment ratio increased from 58.21% to 63.4%; and tertiary gross enrolment also increased from 11.9% to 12.3%. On the quality front as measured by the percentage pass in public examinations, there was notable improvement in the senior school certificate examination (SSCE) results conducted by WAEC and NECO. The universities recorded 18% increase in the number of

graduates that made first class.

The number of academic programmes that earned NUC's full accreditation status increased by 9.2% in 2017. Quite striking also in 2017 is that JAMB processed within a month, admission into the Nigerian higher education system of 1.7

million candidates compared to 1.6 million in 2016. This is the highest in 40 years! In 2017, the Nigerian university system added eight new universities (2 state-owned, 6 private). Our research group documented a 12% drop in reported cult cases on university campuses in 2017 and a significant improvement in the use of technology for teaching, learning and research.

In September 2017, NUC launched the first-of-its-kind in Africa Nigeria University System Open Educational Resources with a draft national policy to back it up.

What about performance in the education sector at the state level? Overall, notable gains were recorded in the 36 states and

the FCT. Let us see a few illustrative examples. With UNIDO support, Anambra State established Learning Initiative For Entrepreneurs (LIFE) programme in 41 senior secondary schools across the three senatorial zones of the state to bolster employability of secondary school graduates and reduce crime rate. Bauchi State allocated 18% of its 2017 budget to the education sector, the highest of any sector in the 2017 budget. In Borno State, 7,169 primary and junior secondary school

teachers were trained in modern methods of teaching.

The state also built a large number of modern schools and remodelled a number of existing ones. A total of 15,197 out-of-school IDPs were provided access to education in 304 non-formal learning centres. At least 3,000 teachers were promoted and the Volunteer Teaching Scheme increased the number of





teachers. Education sector had the highest provision in the 2017 budget of the state.

Ekiti State was outstanding in the 2017 SSCE and improved on its already praiseworthy teacher welfare scheme. Lagos State significantly invested in modernising, beautifying and resourcing its schools for effective teaching and learning and improving teacher welfare. It is finalising its 2017 policy on education which will be the model for other states in the federation.

In Kano State over 40,000 girls were granted scholarship to encourage girl-child enrolment and retention. About 3,000 schools were repaired to enhance learner-friendliness.

Ogun state recorded an unprecedented 23% budgetary allocation to education and elevated the Moshood Abiola Polytechnic to a university of science and technology. An ultramodern Ogun State Polytechnic, Ipokia is being developed. Rivers State government established several ultramodern schools and shut 1,886 illegal schools to maintain standards. To increase funding for education, the Sokoto State government established 1 billion naira annual levy for education with the administration to be overseen by the Sultan of Sokoto, Sa'ad Abubakar III.

Let us stretch our analysis outside our national boundaries and make global comparisons of

the performance of the education sector with other countries in the world. At the 2017 UNESCO General Conference where the education report cards of over 190 countries were rendered, keen watchers from other countries applauded the remarkable strides made in basic and higher education in Nigeria relative to other countries in Africa, Malam Adamu Adamu, Nigeria's minister of education was roundly commended and spurred to stay on the trajectory of making Nigeria the beacon of education success story in Africa especially the march to attain Sustainable Development Goal No. 4 on quality education.

In spite of these gains, a number of dark spots blighted the education firmament in 2017. At the state level, in at least 16 states, teachers were owed upward of five months' salaries. Universities were shut for at least six weeks by "aluta" action at different times by different categories of staff unions. Closure of polytechnics was for longer duration induced by strikes by polytechnic staff.

In many states, strikes by teachers led to pupils staying at home for months. Corruption in education in all its forms is yet to a b a te including those perpetrated by parents, teachers, students and government officials. Teacher quality still remains a vexed issue and the large number of out-school-children is still a national and global embarrassment.

What about outlook for 2018 in the education sector? One of the epochal events in the sector in 2017 was the convening by President Buhari of the ministerial summit on education in November. The implementation of the recommendations of the Retreat with a high degree of fidelity should be the direction to turn in 2018. A few of these are worth highlighting.

The Federal Government working with state and local government actors should vigorously implement and sustainably act on the ten pillars of the Ministerial Strategic Plan by i) addressing the out-ofschool children phenomenon, ii) strengthening basic and secondary school education, iii) prioritising teacher education, capacity building and professional development, iv) promoting adult literacy and special needs education, v) reviving technical and vocational education and training, vi) driving Basic and Secondary Education Curriculum and Policy Matters, vii) ensuring quality and access in higher education, viii) institutionalising education data and planning, ix) promoting Information Communication Technology (ICT) in Education and x) boosting Library Services in Education.

The Federal Government should henceforth commit not less than 15% of budget to education and encourage other levels of government to do so.

Flashback

Study Tour of Egyptian University System

In 2017, the Executive Secretary, Prof. Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, mni, MFR, FNAL pioneered an initiative to foster more collaborations amongst African Universities with a view to encourage joint Researches, Faculty and Students Exchanges Sabbatical and Visiting Appointments and Post-Graduate Trainings.

The initiative is primarily aimed at making universities in Africa sign more MoUs, amongst themselves in view of their shared interests, developmental challenges and common research interests.

In line with the new initiative, Prof. Rasheed hosted the Egyptian Ambassador to Nigeria HE, Assem Hanafy where they discussed extensively on collaborations between Egyptian and Nigerian Universities.

During the discussions, the Egyptian envoy extended an invitation to the NUC to send a delegation to visit Egypt and interact with the Egyptian equivalence of the NUC and tour some Egyptian Universities both Public and Private to initiate some discussions on collaborations.

Following from this, the Executive Secretary constituted a seven-man committee headed by the Deputy Executive Secretary, Malam Ibrahim Dan'iya, three Directors of the commission, DAP, Dr. Gidado B. Kumo, DODE, Dr. Esther Adesina and DCC, Ibrahim Usman Yakasai; two Professors from the Nigerian System, Prof. University Ibrahim Mohammed and Prof. Muhammad Mabrouk and the Egyptian Cultural Attache in Abuja, Dr. Ibrahim Ibrahim. The team toured Egypt between September 21st -October 3, 2017.

The seven-man delegation visited three government agencies; Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research, Supreme Council for Universities (SCU) and the National Authority for Quality assurance and Accreditation in Education (NAQAAE), as well as nine universities consisting of six Public: Universities of Cairo, Kafrelsheikh, Alexandria, Monsuora, Ain Shams and Al-Azhar University and three Private Universities: British University in Egypt, Future University and 6th October University.

The NUC team explored several potential areas of partnerships and collaboration in all the Universities visited for which a comprehensive report was submitted to the Executive Secretary for implementation.



Introduction:

The Federal Executives Council at its meeting held on 28th July 2010 approved that Nigeria should adopt the provisions of the international Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) for Private and Public Sectors respectively.

Consequently, the Federation Accounts Standards Allocation Committee (FAAC) at its meeting held on 13th June 2011 setup a Sub-Committee to provide a roadmap for the implementation of IPSAS in the three tiers of government in Nigeria.

The Roadmap to the adoption of IPSAS was phased as follows:

- Full Adoption of IPSAS Cash effective from 1º January, 2014.
- Adoption of IPSAS Accrual effective from 1st January 2016.

IMPLEMENTING STEPS FOR NEW MEDICAL SCHOOLS, ACCREDITATION ISSUES AND THE NEW MINIMUM BENCHMARK (2015) FOR THE MBBS/BDS PROGRAMMES

PROGRAMMES

Following several Stakeholders' meetings in the last two years and as a prelude to the formal release of the New Minimum Academic Benchmark (2015), proprietors of Medical and Dental Schools in Nigeria (both current and prospective) are requested to note the following implementing steps including relevant adjustments relating to accreditation of Medical/Dental Schools.

- 1. From 1st September 2015, both current and prospective proprietors of Medical and Dental Schools should:
- a. Write a letter to the Executive Secretary stating their intent and provide relevant information as available.
- b. On receipt, (if NUC has no obvious reasons to disqualify the application), they would be sent a copy of the BMAS for MBBS/BDS and advised firmly to ensure that they are strictly complied with.
- c. The setting up of medical schools is not an emergency exercise. To this end, prospective proprietors must own and have in place (prior to a request for a Resource Verification), a fully functional and well run tertiary type hospital. In the circumstance of the above not being in place, consideration for an affiliation with a tertiary government-owned institution may be given only when the said university owns a medical institution fully functional with a minimum of 150 beds and a rural health medical unit. (See Appendix 4 of the BMAS).
- d. A Pre-clinical Accreditation would be expected to take place within two years of a positive Resource Verification. Students can only sit for the second MBBS professional examination (Anatomy, Physiology and Biochemistry) when they have a successful preclinical accreditation. The preclinical accreditation would, amongst others, concentrate largely on the Department of Anatomy, Biochemistry, Physiology, Pathology and Pharmacology and to a lesser extent, Community Health. All evaluated departments must have the minimum requirements in terms of academic staff, non academic staff and laboratory facilities. (See Appendix 3 of the BMAS)
- e. The Commission has now approved a Clinical Accreditation expected to take place within twelve months of a successful preclinical accreditation. Subsequent to that, a reaccreditation exercise will take place every five years.
- 2. With respect to established medical schools, (and irrespective of their accreditation status), it should be noted that only institutions that (by the deadline of March 20th, 2016) have requested and obtained formal approval from the National Universities Commission for a re-evaluation based on the following considerations would be allowed to admit students into the MBBS/BDS programmes from the 2016/2017 academic year:
- a. All Medical and Dental schools must have an approved, and appropriately utilized, Clinical Skills/Simulation centre.
- b. Ensure strict adherence to the proper use of the course system for all approved programmes in





Nigerian Universities. The implication of the above is that a particular programme (subject) is taught not only broken into cluster units of 1-4 but also have the components of university supervised examinations. For clarity, current end of posting examinations (practiced by some medical/dental schools) that neither have units allocated nor follow the standards of a University examination, do not conform to the Minimum Academic Standards as established by the National Universities Commission.

- c. Universities are strongly urged to immediately review their current methods of teaching medical and dental students to include more tutorials, self study group teaching, use of IT in the delivery of courses and simulation/competency based evaluations that must be signed by a lecturer not below the status of a senior lecturer. It must be noted that the confirmation of a successful simulation/competency based evaluation should be a mandatory requirement before the students are eligible to sit for the various professional/sessional examinations
- 3. Proprietors are urged to note the Essential Component changes of the new curriculum expected to be in use from the 2016/2017 academic session. Details of these changes are available in the New Minimum Academic standards booklet and at the National Universities Commission website. (www.nuc.edu.ng.) Major components include the following:
- (a) The approval of three alternative models viz;
- i. A seven year MBBS/BDS programme that encompass a mandatory seamless four-year acquisition of the B.Sc. (Basic Medical Science) with interest in either Anatomy/Physiology/Biochemistry. At the end of seven years, students would have acquired the Bachelor of Basic Medical Science, Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery degrees. In case of the dental programmes, the students would have acquired a degree in Basic Dental Science and Bachelor of Dental Surgery.
- ii. In order to allow for career change for interested non-medical health professionals, the Commission has also approved a four year programme leading to MBBS/BDS for interested and qualified graduates of Nursing, Pharmacology, Physiotherapy, Image Science, Paramedics, Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry and Pharmacology. It must be noted for such to be considered for admission they must have at the WAEC/NECO levels minimum credit scores in Mathematics, English, Physics, Chemistry and Biology at one sitting, prior to the admissions for their first degrees. They must also have a good CGPA.
- iii. Admission into universities based on the current six year programme would be allowed to continue as suitable alternative based on the discretion of the University.
- iv. It should be noted and emphasized that all the above degrees have the Bachelor appellation as they remain undergraduate programmes.
- (b) Specific periods of posting to the department of Family Medicine. The obvious implication here is that, the Universities should create the Department of Family Medicine following their due process.
- (c) Redesignation of the Department of Pharmacology to the Department of Pharmacology and Therapeutics. The department is now expected to provide relevant basic clinical teaching and conduct relevant professional examination in Pharmacology. They will also be expected to provide relevant clinical teaching in Therapeutics. All Universities should set in motion the machinery to achieve the above.
- 4. In view of the above essential component changes of the new curriculum, the Commission will be organising a National training for Medical teachers in Nigerian Universities. Details of the training would be made available shortly.

GUIDELINES ON PART-TIME AND SANDWICH PROGRAMMES IN NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES

Below are guidelines for conducting Part-time and Sandwich programmes in Nigerian universities. All universities currently operating Part-time programmes are expected to comply with the guidelines on programme by programme basis.

Consequently, universities still interested in running Part-time programmes are advised to forward fresh applications to the NUC on programme by programme basis.

This is, however, subject to the readiness of the university to comply with the following extant guidelines on part-time programmes:

- 1. The admission and graduation requirements, Staffing, Library and physical facilities requirements must be in line with the Benchmark Minimum Academic Standards (BMAS) for the various full-time academic programmes;
- 2. For a programme to be eligible to run on part-time basis, the approved full-time equivalent must be available in the university, must have earned full accreditation and must be run within approved campuses;
- 3. The enrolment into part-time programmes must not exceed 20% of total students' population in the programme;
- 4. The minimum duration of the part-time programmes must be 150% of the approved duration of the Full-Time equivalent;
- 5. Approval shall not be granted for part-time programmes in Environmental Sciences, Engineering/Technology, Law, Medicine/Medical Sciences, Pharmacy /Pharmaceutical Sciences, Dentistry; and Veterinary Science;
- 6. All admissions into part-time programmes must be through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Part-time programmes must be run within approved campuses of universities where the human and material resources for the teaching of the programmes are domiciled, i.e. on the main campus of the university;
- 7. Part-time programmes shall be subjected to the NUC accreditation assessment upon maturity of the programme;
- 8. For any programme to be eligible for part-time mode, it must have produced two (2) sets of graduates and satisfied the Resource Verification Requirements.
- 9. Commencement of a part-time programme MUST be subject to NUC's approval. Approval of commencement of all parttime programmes must be obtained.

The National Universities Commission shall not hesitate to apply appropriate sanctions on any university which violates any of the stipulated Guidelines on Part-Time and Sandwich Programmes.
