PMB Charges NUC on Periodic Curriculum Review

— As NOUN Graduates 14,769

he President and commander in Chief of the Armed Forces and the Visitor to the National Open University of Nigeria, NOUN President Muhammadu Buhari, GCFR, has charged the National Universities Commission (NUC), to continue to ensure the periodic review of University Curriculum to meet national needs and be relevant to global demands.

In the Visitor's address read on his behalf by the Executive Secretary NUC, at the 7th convocation ceremony of the National Open University of Nigeria (NOUN) held on Saturday. President Buhari said that as a result of the centrality of the curriculum in the delivery of quality university education, "I have charged the National Universities Commission to continue to ensure the periodic review of Nigerian university

Curriculum to meet national needs and be relevant to global demands".

He said that universities needed to be innovative in their programme offering and in their approach to curriculum development and delivery, advising that "it is therefore instructive for Nigerian universities to continue to embark on strategic capacity building to bring academics upto-date with new trends in their respective subject areas in order to achieve the desired impact."

The Visitor also said that his administration through the National Universities

Commission was committed to ensuring that every facet of university education including the Open and Distance Education was given due priority to provide quality university education to Nigerians, adding that Nigeria was one of the nations of the world that had produced its policy for the Open Education Resource (OER).

The President said he was aware that NUC was developing the Quality Assurance and Accreditation Protocols and instruments for Open and Distance Learning delivery systems in Nigeria based on global best practices.

"Our desire is to have a Nigerian University System, irrespective of the mode of delivery that will deliver on our national needs and aspirations, and also be strategically positioned to compete internationally," he said.


President Buhari reiterated that

no nation had undergone appreciable socio-economic development as envisaged by the present administration under its change agenda without remarkable transformation in its education system. "Education will, therefore, remain a high priority item in the administration's agenda in the drive to avail Nigerians of full access to educational services that would guarantee them competitive opportunities and advantages to effectively drive the economy," he stressed.

Mr. President maintained that his administration would continue to encourage Nigerian universities to build very strong internal quality assurance mechanisms, stressing that when this becomes a culture within the system it would guarantee quality attainment, maintenance and improvement.

He stated that, his government believed that NOUN should strengthen its learner support services in order to make its mode of delivery efficient and effective; thus ensuring that students were not disenfranchised by subscribing to the programmes of the university. "In the light of this, government will continue to accord the graduates of NOUN and those of other Distance Learning institutions in Nigeria, due recognition to buttress the fact that they are not inferior to those of conventional universities" he assured.

He emphasised that "there shall




be no discrimination in terms of employability and opportunity for graduates of Open and Distance Learning programmes to pursue higher degrees either in conventional universities or the ODL setting."

He noted that in line with global best practices, one of the reasons for the establishment of the National Open University of Nigeria was to reduce to the barest minimum if not completely eradicate the challenge of access to Nigerian Universities.

He observed that since establishment, NOUN had been able to absorb qualified university candidates who would have been denied admission into Nigerian Universities for lack of space.

According to the Visitor, the former President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Chief Olusegun Obansanjo *GCFR*, whom I refer to as the "Father of Open and Distance Education in





Nigeria, for his belief in the opportunity the ODL provides, because of his quest for quality education, could have opted to fulfill his desire for university education in any of the Ivy League universities of the world and none of them could have denied him this opportunity. Rather than seek higher education outside the shores of Nigeria, President Obasanjo enrolled in the programme of the National Open University of Nigeria and today he is a proud Doctorate graduate of the university. The National

Open University of Nigeria and indeed Nigerians will continue to appreciate your belief, recognition and support for the Open and Distance Education in Nigeria. "We are very proud of you."

He congratulated the Chancellor, the Pro-Chancellor, the Governing Council, the Vice-Chancellor, the Senate, staff, students and parents for this great achievement and singled out the graduating students for commendation for seizing the unique opportunity which NOUN offered to avail themselves of university education, particularly the former President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Chief Olusegun Obansanjo GCFR.

He also congratulated the graduating students on this outstanding occasion, describing them as the potential experts, future leaders and next-generation-solution providers in various sectors of our national

life.

Chancellor of the university, HRH Igwe, Ambassador (Dr.) Lawrence Okolo Chikezie Agubuzu, OON in his address observed that today's convocation was very special for number of reasons, including parading the highest number of graduants and the first PhD graduate in the person of former President, Olusegun Obasanjo who graduated with a doctorate degree in Christian Theology.

He thanked President Muhammadu Buhari for his exceptional support to the university and enjoined the federal government to intervene in the lingering crises and misunderstanding existing between NOUN and the Council of Legal Education as well as the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC).

Vice Chancellor, Professor Abdalla Uba Adamu in his address explained that today marked the 7th successful graduation ceremony of the students of the university in various disciplines. A total of 14, 769 students across the disciplines, the largest number of students so far graduated by the university. The number is made up of 207 Diplomas, 6,162 Degrees, 6, 380 postgraduate degrees, out of which 41 made first class.

The Vice Chancellor said that his greatest pride, today however was the graduation of the university's first PhD student in

the person of His Excellency Olusegun Obasanjo former president and former head of state of Nigeria who at this stage becomes the oldest PhD graduating student in Nigeria. He achieved this by successful completion of a rigorous course of study and going through the examination processes leading to PhD in Christian Theology and its conferment by the University Senate thereby making a powerful statement about lifelong education.

Professor Abdalla Uba Adamu gave an account of his stewardship over the last one year, saying the university had recorded significant milestones in its transformation from evolution to revelation as a learning citadel.

He enumerated some of his achievements to include, participating in NUC's production of BMAS for Film production and Broadcasting; study center reforms; establishing

of NOUN Business School; creation of new Center for Entrepreneurship and General Studies and establishing of Microsoft Certification Examination and IT training Centers.

Others, he said, were sustaining Linkages and Partnerships with both local and international education institutions, positive resource verification of additional programmes at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels by the NUC.

In infrastructural Development, the Vice Chancellor said, the university had benefitted from the TETfund intervention and the NEEDS assessment fund which was used to construct a warehouse for study materials, a Mass Comm. Center and a Printing Press.

In a goodwill message after receiving his degree, Dr. Olusegun Obasanjo thanked and





appreciated all who made it possible for him to obtain the PhD ranging from his lecturers, friends, family as well as well-wishers. He said he was proud and happy to own a PhD from one of the best ODL University in the World and to be the first, made it more special and honorable.

The retired General explained that he joined the university in order to prove two points; one was to prove that the ODL mode of education delivery as offered by NOUN was by no means inferior to the conventional mode, second also to prove that getting education should be from cradle to grave, it had no cultural barriers, social background or limitation. He opined that ODL is cheaper.

He recalled that while in NOUN he participated in all school activities, doing class work and project just like other students without any preferential treatment. He reiterated the importance of educating the populace especially the leaders who must know who they are leading, to where and how to get there. He appealed for funding to NOUN in order to increase access.

He said that although he is not applying for any new job with the PhD certificate, would be willing to contribute his services to God and humanity whenever he is called upon to do so.

Bayelsa State Governor, His Excellency, Serieki Dickson in his own Goodwill message stated that no meaningful Development and stability occurs without education. He said "education is the only investment that there is no loss. It is investment that does not require maintenance or repair. It is only by creating a critical

mass of knowledgeable population that we will get to our dream land of prosperity in Nigeria."

Governor Dickson also said that the issue of education was so important that he declared emergency in the sector in Bayelsa which made it possible to build boarding schools for the first time in the state equipped with state of the art and modern facilities.

He congratulated Dr. Obasanjo and called for support from all and sundry to NOUN.

He concluded that Dr. Obasanjo taught us a lesson that going to school does not know boundary or age limit.



We'll Engage Executive for Full Budget Releases to NUC, Education

The House of Representative Committee on Tertiary Institutions and Tetfund Chairman, Honourable Aminu Fagge lamented the unfortunate lack of full budget releases to National Universities Commission which hampered most of its statutory functions.

The chairman said this at the House Committee 2018 budget defence held last Wednesday at its chambers in the National Assembly Complex, Abuja.

Honourable Fagge stated that the committee was mandated to hear from every institution on its budgetary performance and projections of the current year for proper planning. Last year the committee had visited about 80% of the institutions and

organisations under its purview by way of oversight function to ascertain the level of compliance with the budgetary provisions as appropriated and assented to by President Muhammadu Buhari.

Speaking during the 2018 defence, the result of the visit revealed abysmal level of implementation which was occasioned by poor releases of budgetary allocations. He said the unfortunate situation was mostly responsible for the non-performance of most institutions and organisations.

The chairman mentioned that the scenario must be addressed adding that the National Assembly cannot fold its arm to allow public servants jeopardize what has been passed and

approved by Mr. President on the grounds of bureaucratic contingency. He said "This is unacceptable and the bureaucratic constraints must be checked in order to move the country forward and be accountable to the people."

Honourable Fagge further stated that the Committee would do everything necessary to put up a realistic and implementable budget. He therefore solicited for openness, sincere and befitting budgetary submission from every institution and organisation. He concluded his submission by pledging his support and of his colleagues in the discharge of the assignment.

The Committee members in their individual addresses

agreed with the chairman to ensure that the Commission is equipped to deliver its statutory mandate.

In his submission, the Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Abuja, Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed mni, MFR, FNAL, assisted by Director, Directorate of Finance and Accounts, Mr. Sam Onazi and Director, Directorate of Corporate Communications, Mal. Ibrahim Usman Yakasai, presented the NUC's releases and utilization of funds approved in the 2016-2017 budget. The submission included Internally Generated Revenue accrued to the Commission, percentages of work executed on various projects as well as utilization and projections for 2018 fiscal year.

The NUC scribe expressed his deep appreciation to the House Committee for understanding the challenging issues besetting the NUC in particular and the Nigerian University System in general. The Executive Secretary pointed out the Commission's readiness to have a break on its normal operations, adding that a powerful committee has been constituted to advise on the mode

and strategy to reposition NUC on critical areas that included but not limited to:

- i. Curriculum Review
- ii. Ranking of Nigerian Universities to enhance healthy competition and
- iii. Research Policy on Postgraduate training and development, amongst other areas.

Professor Rasheed lamented, as rightly observed by the Chairman, that NUC was only able to access 16%, upto December, 2017, of its total budget. He concluded by submitting that the total revenue expected to accrue to the Commission would be one hundred and eight million for 2018 fiscal year against less than one hundred million last year.

The Executive Secretary invited

PASET holds Ministerial Meeting on Higher Education and Skills Development

The Partnership for Skills in Applied Sciences and Engineering Technology (PASET), last Monday, held a ministerial meeting on Higher Education and Skills Development, at the Terrou-Bi Hotel, Dakar, Senegal, aimed at sharing knowledge and experiences regarding the implementation of PASET initiatives as well as mobilising more support for PASET among participating, committed and non-committed countries in sub-Saharan Africa (SSA).

Other objectives of the Ministerial Meeting were to shore up more support amongst African countries, private sector and donor agencies as well as to share experience amongst stakeholders on adoptable strategies and plan next steps. It was expected that the partnerships between all stakeholders would promote innovation in skills development

in Africa.

Declaring the meeting open, the Honourable Minister of Higher Education, Senegal and PASET Chair, Professor Mary Teuw Niane, welcomed participants to the meeting. He noted the importance of PASET in fostering high quality Applied Science and Engineering Technology (ASET) programmes from the Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) to the Post Graduate and research level. This applied to sectors with potential for growth and employment generation and geared towards the structural transformation of SSA countries.

Professor Niane stated that PASET also focuses on building relationships with countries from Asia and Latin America that have successfully built their technical-scientific capacity to support their socio-economic development, through knowledge-sharing,

technical assistance and financial support.

In her keynote address, Chairman, Board of PASET, Professor Aminata Sall Diallo, stated that PASET is an African initiative poised to address issues concerning technical education. giving an overview of PASET, which includes partnerships with Korea, China and India, Professor Diallo highlighted the importance of PASET to the region as well as its initiatives, which include the Regional Scholarship and Innovation Fund (RSIF) being handled by the Association of Africa Universities (AAU), benchmarking of higher education and TVET institutions, regional fora of knowledge and experiencesharing as well as country ASET action plan and regional TVET centres.

In her presentation Dr. Ekwa

Bentil, of the World Bank, outlined some of the progress and achievements recorded by PASET in the last one year to include: an indication of interest by 15 more Africa governments to join PASET as well as the signing of an MoU between China's Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Education and the World Bank, to support PASET. She noted that, on the initiative of RSIF, PASET had received financial contributions from Kenya and Rwanda, while contributions were expected from Ethiopia, Senegal and Cote d'Ivoire, in 2018. It is expected that other countries across sub-Saharan Africa and the World

Bank would also make contributions to the Project.

Other achievements highlighted included the enrolment of the first cohort of RSIF students for PhD programmes, which is to be finalised early in 2018 as well as the Korea Development Institute's Knowledge-Sharing programme (KSP), with PASET, to help countries develop human resource development plans for priority sectors.

Participants at the meeting were drawn from sub-Saharan Africa countries and comprised mostly, Ministers of Education, ECOWAS chiefs, heads of e d u c a t i o n a l a g e n c i e s, international Non-Governmental Organisations, the World Bank and the private sector.

The Nigerian delegation was led by the Honourable Minister of State for Education, Professor Anthony Anwukah, who was accompanied by the Deputy Director, Science and Technical Education, Mrs. Tina Eyaru and Mr. Philip Njoku, both of the Ministry of Education. Also in the delegation were the Africa Centres of Excellence Project Coordinator, Dr. Joshua Atah and ACE Project Management Officer, Mr. Peter Tobrise.





...Holds ACE Impact Consultative Meeting

In a related development, the Africa Centres of Excellence for Development Impact (ACE Impact) Ministerial Consultative meeting took place last Tuesday to discuss the performance of the first phase of ACE (ACE 1), overview of Africa Centres of Excellence Development Impact (ACE Impact) as well as sector prioritisation, thematic areas and the selection process for ACE Impact (ACE 3).

The meeting, which was declared open by the Senegalese Minister of Higher Education, Professor Mary Teuw Niane, was co-chaired by the ECOWAS Commissioner for Education, Sciences and Culture, Professor

Hamidou Boly.

The ACE Impact was as a result of the gains and successes recorded by ACE I and II in the area of increased quality and quantity of postgraduate education, through regional specialisation and participation.

Based on the lessons learned under ACE I and II, ACE III aims to work better across sectors, promote more industry collaboration, simplify flow of funds and support more policy harmonisation initiatives in higher education across sub-Saharan Africa.

The proposed thematic areas for

ACE impact include Power & Energy, Health, Public Health/Economics, Nursing, Environment, Agriculture, Transportation, Water, Urban Planning and Design, Housing/Land Development, Education (STEM teaching), Higher Education Management, Mining, Forestry Management, Migration and Security, Information & Communication Technology, Artificial Intelligence/Machine Learning/Data Analytics, Quantitative Economics, Environment/Climate and environmental safeguards.

The Minister of Education, Malam Adamu Adamu charged universities to fast-track the pace of knowledge generation to meet national needs and address several practical national problems that currently confront the nation.

The minister was represented by the Deputy Executve Secretary, Administration, Mal. Ibrahim I. Dan'iya. He said this while delivering his address at Fountain University's 7th Convocation Ceremony held last Saturday at Osogbo.

The minister said it was imperative and necessary in view of the fact that considering that universities were the engine for development. He said the present administration had continued to lay emphasis on education considering its important role as the bedrock for any form of national

development and advancement.

In his good will message delivered at the 10th year anniversary and 7th convocation ceremony of Fountain University, Osogbo, the Minister congratulated the graduating students for being found worthy both in character and learning to be awarded with the various degrees, certificates and diplomas of the university. The Minister informed the graduates that they had been equipped with the basic tools to assist them navigate through the stormy waters of life.

He assured them that though the credentials they had been given may not immediately result in paid employment, the vast entrepreneurial and other life-supporting skills which had formed part of their education in the university will not only equip them to be self-employed but also employers of labour.

The Minister appreciated institutions that ensured peace reigned in their respective domains as according to him, "Education and indeed other facets of our national life can only thrive in an atmosphere of peace and harmony".

In his Convocation address titled "Moving forward slow and steady winning the race", the Acting Vice Chancellor, Professor Abdullateef Usman informed the gathering that the University had been growing from strength to strength as it had made giant strides in academic activities. Some of the areas he said included the attainment of full accreditation status for all its programmes that were duly visited by the NUC and other relevant professional bodies; approval by the Council for additional programmes to take off next academic session as well as its visibility in internet. He said that Student enrolment had increased from 195 at inception to about 315 in January 2017 and by the end of 2018 the student enrolment was expected to grow above 400.

On infrastructural development, Professor Usman noted that the University had been moving forward slowly and steadily with the donation of facilities by some good spirited individuals. Some of the projects included S. O Babalola Senate Building, multi million naira masjid, a forty bed

space luxury hostel, six units of two bedroom flat and a block of four class rooms among others.

The Acting Vice Chancellor stated that in keeping faith with its mandate of rewarding academic excellence, the pioneer Master of Science Degree was conferred on four students having met all the requirements and conditions for the award of Master of Science (M.Sc.) degree in Biological Sciences and Chemical Sciences of Fountain University, Osogbo and in accordance with international best practices.

Similarly, two hundred and eighty-three students were also conferred with the Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.) degree from various departments. This was made up of one hundred and seventy seven (177) from the College of Management and Social Sciences and one hundred and six (106) from the College of Natural and Applied Sciences.

He disclosed that the best graduating student had a total CGPA of 4.96. adding that the

current sets of graduands recorded the highest number of First Class and Second Class Upper Divisions since its establishment. He gave a further break down of the graduands to include 12 First Class, 78 Second Class (Upper Division), 76 Second Class (Lower Division), and 11 third class.

According to him, the natural climate in Osun State had been very friendly, as such, the university made use of the opportunity to establish Teaching and Research Farm in addition to

the establishment of Center for Herbal Research. This, he said, enabled their graduates to improve their skills in simple agricultural practices capable of enhancing self-engagement.

In his speech the outgoing Pro-Chancellor and Chairman of Council, Professor Is-haq Oloyede recalled that he accepted to be Chairman of Council of Fountain University, Osogbo in 2015. He appreciated the prominent individuals as well as the Parents Forum for their immense contribution to the development of the University with the donation of several facilities.

Professor Oloyede stated that his appointment as the Registrar of JAMB necessitated his resignation as Chairman of Council of the university, he however expressed optimism that his successor would enhance the physical and academic development of the university.

In his goodwill message the Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Rasheed, mni, MFR, FNAL said he was optimistic that the graduands would apply the knowledge they acquired to become productive citizens of the country and create jobs for themselves rather than seeking for white-collar jobs which were becoming competitively difficult to find.

Professor Rasheed said that with the increase in the demand for the establishment of Private Universities in Nigeria, which currently stands at 74, the survival of each private University obviously depended on the quality of its products as well as its ability to generate or key into cutting edge ideas that promote academic excellence.

The NUC Scribe informed the gathering that as part of the NUC's efforts towards repositioning the Nigerian University System (NUS) for optimum performance and global competitiveness, the Commission had within the last two years, initiated a number of reforms. These include; the

streamlining of Programme Accreditation and Resource Verification for new Programmes to be conducted at specific periods annually for operational cohesion in the system; Accreditation of programmes on programme basis as against discipline for a more in depth assessment; Institutional Accreditation. which was on the process was expected to be a precursor to the national ranking of Nigerian Universities; The commencement of accreditation

of part-time Programmes and the resumption of the Nigerian University System Annual Review Meetings (USARM) amongst others.

The Executive Secretary said that the Commission, under his leadership, had recently constituted a strategic advisory committee comprising of very senior credible academics under the chairmanship of a former Executive Secretary of the Commission, Professor Peter Okebukola, with former ViceChancellor of Bayero University, Kano and former Chairman, Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) Professor Attahiru Jega, among others as members.

NUC MAKES HISTORY IN RANKING OF OPEN EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES (OER)

The National Universities Commission has made history in conducting the first-ever ranking of Open Educational Resources (OER) held in institutional repositories. It is the first exercise of its kind in the world and it was initiated by the Executive Secretary of NUC, Professor Abubakar Rasheed, mni,MFR for application in the Nigerian University System. The exercise showed that with 12,070 quality OER holdings presented by 50 universities for the inaugural exercise, Nigerian Universities are now among the best in Africa in OER. It is estimated that with full release of the OER holdings and participation by all universities, this number may quadruple in the next two years making the Nigerian University system the richest in OER in Africa. The OER ranking exercise is to be conducted twice a year.

Open Educational Resources (OER) are teaching, learning and research materials in any medium, digital or otherwise, that reside in the public domain or have been released under an open license that permits no-cost access, use, adapt and redistribute by others with no or limited restrictions. They are technology-enabled, open provision of educational resources for consultation, use and adaptation by a community of users for non-commercial purposes. Materials that constitute OER include curriculum maps, course materials, textbooks, streaming videos, pictorial materials, multimedia applications, podcast, and any other materials that have been designed for use in teaching and learning environment.

The OER ranking exercise was conducted by the 12-member National Experts Group on OER Ranking (NEGOR) and a four-person team of external experts from outside Nigeria.

Fifty universities that participated in the inaugural edition were ranked by (a) ownership (federal, State and private) and (b) generation within ownership. The results are shown below.

The Federal Executives Council at its meeting held on 28th July 2010 approved that Nigeria should adopt the provisions of the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) for Private and Public Sectors respectively.

Consequently, the Federation Accounts Standards Allocation Committee (FAAC) at its meeting held on 13th June 2011 setup a Sub-Committee to provide a roadmap for the implementation of IPSAS in the three tiers of governmeent in Nigeria.

The Roadmap to the adoption of IPSAS was phased as follows:

- Full Adoption of IPSAS Cash effective from 1st January, 2014.
- Adoption of IPSAS Accrual effective from 1st January 2016.

The National Universities Commission (NUC) has commenced the IPSAS implementation project that will enable a seamless adoption of the IPSAS accrual in the preparation and presentation of Financial Statements in line with the directives of Federation Accounts Allocation Committee (FAAC) Sub-Committee on implementation of IPSAS.

The Programme for now is only available for candidates who wish to obtain BSc Degree in Economics.

IMPLEMENTING STEPS FOR NEW MEDICAL SCHOOLS, ACCREDITATION ISSUES AND THE NEW MINIMUM BENCHMARK (2015) FOR THE MBBS/BDS PROGRAMMES

PROGRAMMES

Following several Stakeholders' meetings in the last two years and as a prelude to the formal release of the New Minimum Academic Benchmark (2015), proprietors of Medical and Dental Schools in Nigeria (both current and prospective) are requested to note the following implementing steps including relevant adjustments relating to accreditation of Medical/Dental Schools.

- 1. From 1st September 2015, both current and prospective proprietors of Medical and Dental Schools should:
- a. Write a letter to the Executive Secretary stating their intent and provide relevant information as available.
- b. On receipt, (if NUC has no obvious reasons to disqualify the application), they would be sent a copy of the BMAS for MBBS/BDS and advised firmly to ensure that they are strictly complied with.
- c. The setting up of medical schools is not an emergency exercise. To this end, prospective proprietors must own and have in place (prior to a request for a Resource Verification), a fully functional and well run tertiary type hospital. In the circumstance of the above not being in place, consideration for an affiliation with a tertiary government-owned institution may be given only when the said university owns a medical institution fully functional with a minimum of 150 beds and a rural health medical unit. (See Appendix 4 of the BMAS).
- d. A Pre-clinical Accreditation would be expected to take place within two years of a positive Resource Verification. Students can only sit for the second MBBS professional examination (Anatomy, Physiology and Biochemistry) when they have a successful preclinical accreditation. The preclinical accreditation would, amongst others, concentrate largely on the Department of Anatomy, Biochemistry, Physiology, Pathology and Pharmacology and to a lesser extent, Community Health. All evaluated departments must have the minimum requirements in terms of academic staff, non academic staff and laboratory facilities. (See Appendix 3 of the BMAS)
- e. The Commission has now approved a Clinical Accreditation expected to take place within twelve months of a successful preclinical accreditation. Subsequent to that, a reaccreditation exercise will take place every five years.
- 2. With respect to established medical schools, (and irrespective of their accreditation status), it should be noted that only institutions that (by the deadline of March 20th, 2016) have requested and obtained formal approval from the National Universities Commission for a re-evaluation based on the following considerations would be allowed to admit students into the MBBS/BDS programmes from the 2016/2017 academic year:
- a. All Medical and Dental schools must have an approved, and appropriately utilized, Clinical Skills/Simulation centre.
- b. Ensure strict adherence to the proper use of the course system for all approved programmes in





Nigerian Universities. The implication of the above is that a particular programme (subject) is taught not only broken into cluster units of 1-4 but also have the components of university supervised examinations. For clarity, current end of posting examinations (practiced by some medical/dental schools) that neither have units allocated nor follow the standards of a University examination, do not conform to the Minimum Academic Standards as established by the National Universities Commission.

- c. Universities are strongly urged to immediately review their current methods of teaching medical and dental students to include more tutorials, self study group teaching, use of IT in the delivery of courses and simulation/competency based evaluations that must be signed by a lecturer not below the status of a senior lecturer. It must be noted that the confirmation of a successful simulation/competency based evaluation should be a mandatory requirement before the students are eligible to sit for the various professional/sessional examinations
- 3. Proprietors are urged to note the Essential Component changes of the new curriculum expected to be in use from the 2016/2017 academic session. Details of these changes are available in the New Minimum Academic standards booklet and at the National Universities Commission website. (www.nuc.edu.ng.) Major components include the following:
- (a) The approval of three alternative models viz;
- i. A seven year MBBS/BDS programme that encompass a mandatory seamless four-year acquisition of the B.Sc. (Basic Medical Science) with interest in either Anatomy/Physiology/Biochemistry. At the end of seven years, students would have acquired the Bachelor of Basic Medical Science, Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery degrees. In case of the dental programmes, the students would have acquired a degree in Basic Dental Science and Bachelor of Dental Surgery.
- ii. In order to allow for career change for interested non-medical health professionals, the Commission has also approved a four year programme leading to MBBS/BDS for interested and qualified graduates of Nursing, Pharmacology, Physiotherapy, Image Science, Paramedics, Anatomy, Physiology, Biochemistry and Pharmacology. It must be noted for such to be considered for admission they must have at the WAEC/NECO levels minimum credit scores in Mathematics, English, Physics, Chemistry and Biology at one sitting, prior to the admissions for their first degrees. They must also have a good CGPA.
- iii. Admission into universities based on the current six year programme would be allowed to continue as suitable alternative based on the discretion of the University.
- iv. It should be noted and emphasized that all the above degrees have the Bachelor appellation as they remain undergraduate programmes.
- (b) Specific periods of posting to the department of Family Medicine. The obvious implication here is that, the Universities should create the Department of Family Medicine following their due process.
- (c) Redesignation of the Department of Pharmacology to the Department of Pharmacology and Therapeutics. The department is now expected to provide relevant basic clinical teaching and conduct relevant professional examination in Pharmacology. They will also be expected to provide relevant clinical teaching in Therapeutics. All Universities should set in motion the machinery to achieve the above.
- 4. In view of the above essential component changes of the new curriculum, the Commission will be organising a National training for Medical teachers in Nigerian Universities. Details of the training would be made available shortly.

In the publication, the universities were requested to fully disclose all Part-Time and Sandwich programmes, with respect to enrolment and staffing profile, within four weeks of the publication, and to conduct in-house staff and student audit and forward same to the Commission. As a follow up to this, the Commission vide a letter dated 14 January, 2013, sent a reminder to the universities requesting those that were yet to provide information on their Part-Time and Sandwich programmes as well as affiliation arrangements to do so on or before 15 February, 2013.

GUIDELINES ON PART-TIME AND SANDWICH PROGRAMMES IN NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES

Below are guidelines for conducting Part-time and Sandwich programmes in Nigerian universities. All universities currently operating Part-time programmes are expected to comply with the guidelines on programme by programme basis.

Consequently, universities still interested in running Part-time programmes are advised to forward fresh applications to the NUC on programme by programme basis.

This is, however, subject to the readiness of the university to comply with the following extant guidelines on part-time programmes:

- 1. The admission and graduation requirements, Staffing, Library and physical facilities requirements must be in line with the Benchmark Minimum Academic Standards (BMAS) for the various full-time academic programmes;
- 2. For a programme to be eligible to run on part-time basis, the approved full-time equivalent must be available in the university, must have earned full accreditation and must be run within approved campuses;
- 3. The enrolment into part-time programmes must not exceed 20% of total students' population in the programme;
- 4. The minimum duration of the part-time programmes must be 150% of the approved duration of the Full-Time equivalent;
- 5. Approval shall not be granted for part-time programmes in Environmental Sciences, Engineering/Technology, Law, Medicine/Medical Sciences, Pharmacy /Pharmaceutical Sciences, Dentistry; and Veterinary Science;
- 6. All admissions into part-time programmes must be through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Part-time programmes must be run within approved campuses of universities where the human and material resources for the teaching of the programmes are domiciled, i.e. on the main campus of the university;
- 7. Part-time programmes shall be subjected to the NUC accreditation assessment upon maturity of the programme;
- 8. For any programme to be eligible for part-time mode, it must have produced two (2) sets of graduates and satisfied the Resource Verification Requirements.
- 9. Commencement of a part-time programme MUST be subject to NUC's approval. Approval of commencement of all parttime programmes must be obtained.

The National Universities Commission shall not hesitate to apply appropriate sanctions on any university which violates any of the stipulated Guidelines on Part-Time and Sandwich Programmes.

- 4. Submission of application forms and relevant documents
- Intensive review/analysis of documents by experts in relevant NUC departments
