He said that Vitafoam Nigeria Plc had donated a Polyurethane Laboratory worth over N20 million to the Central Research Laboratory. He added that the university's collaboration.

Professor Ogundipe further announced that the university had a strong team of researchers working on cyber-security and as part of the benefits for their work; the university was recently admitted into the Global Epic, an international group of 21 institutions which co-create

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and adopt world-changing solutions to cyber-security all over the world.

Another achievement, he said, was the collaboration with the National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA), with the recently signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on training of scholars in Master's degree in Cyber Law to strengthen the regulation of cyber-security in Nigeria, making UNILAG to be the first university in Nigeria to train professionals in Cyber Law.

He said that the university also

stated that the UNILAG Business would soon take-off and would run short executive courses and professional degree programmes with experienced industry personnel as facilitators. Also, the UNILAG Microfinance Bank which would be an additional source of revenue would soon commence operations.

The bank would help members of staff and the university community to access loans to meet some of their financial needs through home ownership, small scale enterprises, school fees and car purchase among others.

FCC Dept. Pays Advocacy Visit to NUC

The newly established Department of Socio-Economic and Infrastructural Development, Federal Character Commission (FCC), led by the Director, Mr. Dipo Akinsola, last Thursday, visited the National Universities Commission (NUC) on sensitisation and advocacy visit bordering on its mandate, as specified in paragraph 8 (1) b of Section C, third schedule of Nigeria's Constitution.

Briefing the Executive Secretary, Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, mni, MFR, FNAL, Mr. Akinsola highlighted that the FCC since the last 22 years had been carrying its first mandate of ensuring fair and equitable distribution of manpower among the 36 states and FCT.

He recalled that only last year, the President gave legal backing to its second mandate, that borders on equitable and fair said, only took off effectively four weeks ago. According to him, this lacuna led to the decision of the new Directorate to embark on advocacy to all of its identified stakeholders. NUC, he said, was critical and one of the biggest partners that it was willing to work with, as the universities was under its purview.

Mr. Akinsola said the FCC was aware that the universities through the NUC offer social services, in terms of recruitment Responding, the Executive Secretary, represented by the Director, Research, Innovation and Communication Technology (DRICT), Dr. Suleiman Ramon-Yusuf, acknowledged the visitors for finding time to sensitise the NUC on its line of duty, especially as it borders on enforcement of equitable distribution of social services to the citizens.

He observed that Government was going beyond the issue of





recruitment to ensuring that facilities were evenly distributed, explaining that this was exemplified by government giving all states ample opportunity to have federal universities in their domain.

Professor Rasheed stressed that justice and equity would guarantee sustainable economic development as long as the FCC applied the right mechanisms. He argued that projects must not only be based on needs, but even spread. He assured the team that

The executive secretary, therefore, informed the delegation that the University Autonomy Act, make it mandatory for universities to run as semi-autonomous institutions.

Harping on the request for inclusion in the admission process for students in the Nigerian University System (NUS), the NUC scribe advised the FCC to banish such idea, insisting that it would not fly. The universities, he stated, had a stakeholder's forum where

While urging the FCC to ensure equity and fairness in the discharge of its functions, Professor Rasheed observed that there seemed to be information gap on the part of the FCC's new Directorate, as it failed to realise that NUC with its present status does not meddle into admission of students in the universities.

NUC Committed to Review of Medical Curriculum —— Prof. Rasheed

The Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission (NUC), Professor Abubakar Adamu Rasheed, mni, MFR, FNAL, last Thursday reinstated the Commission's commitment to the review of Medicine programme curriculum, to bring it at par with global best practices and standards


He said this when he received the members of the Association of Nigerian Physicians in Americas (ANPA), who paid him a courtesy call to rekindle their interest and support to the review of Medical Sciences curriculum which started way back in 2011.

Professor Rasheed, who was represented by the Director of Accreditation, Dr Noel Saliu noted that it was an aberration for the Federal Ministry of Health (FMH) to venture to review and implement a new curriculum for the Medical Sciences programme.

He said it was the exclusive rights of the NUC to lay down Benchmark Minimum Academic Standards (BMAS) for all degree programmes in the Nigerian University System (NUS).

The Executive Secretary acknowledged that the initiative of ANPA was in line with the ongoing reforms in the Commission. Sighting that as

In his words: "We are aware of the deficiencies in the Curriculum been used to train our Lending his voice, NUC Director of Academic Planning (DAP), Dr. Gidado Kumo remarked that following the Commission's resolve to review the medicine Curriculum, the NUC management visited some leading and high profiled universities in



Sudan and Egypt. He added that what the team saw was an eye opener as to how the programme should be reviewed in Nigeria.

"We noticed that in Egypt, they have discarded some aspect of the curriculum and upgraded some aspect in line with current realities. For example, while we still run the six years MBBS plus one year clinical practice, other countries now run five years MBBS plus two years clinical practice, laying more emphasis on the skills component of the training. It is important that we accommodate these changes in other to upgrade the proposed curriculum in line with global standard," he said.

review was concerned, time was of the essence, stressing the need for a patch-review in order to fast-track the process and ensure the quick implementation of the new curriculum.

He explained that it was a herculean task for medical students to find placement at the time they want to undergo the one year clinical training, adding that the curriculum review should also address such.

In his capacity as Director of Accreditation, Dr. Saliu assured the ANPA delegation that the Commission, with the approval of the Executive Secretary would convene a critical stakeholders In her speech, ANPA President, Dr. Chermine Emelife recalled that the interest of the association to lend its support to the review of the Medical Sciences curriculum started in 2011.

According to her, ANPA in collaboration with the (FMoH) and NUC set up a committee to review the curriculum of the Medical Sciences discipline. The outcome of the review, she noted, was forwarded to the then Minister of Health for approval and implementation.

The ANPA President observed that the reviewed curriculum was only partially implemented by the University of Ibadan, with other

Contributing, the NUC Director of Research, Innovation and Information Technology, Dr. Suleiman Ramon-Yusuf, stated that as far as the curriculum meeting to holistically address the problems affecting the training of medical students in the country. universities not following sit. She argued that the failure to carry NUC along in the curriculum review process led to the difficulty in its implementation.



Dr. Chermine, however, noted that the unimplemented curriculum reviewed years back had already become outdated. In view of this, she said, ANPA insisted that the right measures must be taken in the training of Medical students in the country, leading the association to seeking a way forward with NUC, as the driving force.

According to her, "we need to bring our medical students to speed on current development in the Medical profession and the only way out is to improve the Curriculum in line with global best practice in our ever changing world".

She described as obsolete the curriculum currently been used

to train medical doctors in the country, explaining that it was not in tune with current realities where the world was moving fast in the field of Medicine with ground breaking innovations and technologies in use. She insisted that Nigeria could not afford to lag behind.

She said: "As we speak this is already affecting our medical doctor seeking to practice abroad, as they are subjected to competency test or are made to undergo additional training to enable them meet up with current development in the field".

She stated that in view of the need to correct the anomalies, ANPA had to retrace its steps to the Commission, to ensure that its attempt at revamping the Medical Profession in Nigeria produces the desired

RE: MORATORIUM ON PART-TIME PROGRAMMES

he National Universities Commission, cognizant of the need to streamline the operations of Part Time and Sandwich programmes in Nigerian universities, had through a publication in the print media, including the Guardian and Sun Newspapers of Monday, 19th March, 2012, placed a moratorium on admission into parttime programmes in Nigerian universities. In the publication, the universities were requested to fully disclose all Part-Time and Sandwich programmes, with respect to enrolment and staffing profile, within four weeks of the publication, and to conduct in-house staff and student audit and forward same to the Commission. As a follow up to this, the Commission vide a letter dated 14 January, 2013, sent a reminder to the universities requesting those that were yet to provide information on their Part-Time and Sandwich programmes as well as affiliation arrangements to do so on or before 15 February, 2013.

GUIDELINES ON PART-TIME AND SANDWICH PROGRAMMES IN NIGERIAN UNIVERSITIES

Below are guidelines for conducting Part-time and Sandwich programmes in Nigerian universities. All universities currently operating Part-time programmes are expected to comply with the guidelines on programme by programme basis.

Consequently, universities still interested in running Part-time programmes are advised to forward fresh applications to the NUC on programme by programme basis.

This is, however, subject to the readiness of the university to comply with the following extant guidelines on part-time programmes:

- 1. The admission and graduation requirements, Staffing, Library and physical facilities requirements must be in line with the Benchmark Minimum Academic Standards (BMAS) for the various full-time academic programmes;
- 2. For a programme to be eligible to run on part-time basis, the approved full-time equivalent must be available in the university, must have earned full accreditation and must be run within approved campuses;
- 3. The enrolment into part-time programmes must not exceed 20% of total students' population in the programme;
- 4. The minimum duration of the part-time programmes must be 150% of the approved duration of the Full-Time equivalent;
- 5. Approval shall not be granted for part-time programmes in Environmental Sciences, Engineering/Technology, Law, Medicine/Medical Sciences, Pharmacy /Pharmaceutical Sciences, Dentistry; and Veterinary Science;
- 6. All admissions into part-time programmes must be through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Part-time programmes must be run within approved campuses of universities where the human and material resources for the teaching of the programmes are domiciled, i.e. on the main campus of the university;
- 7. Part-time programmes shall be subjected to the NUC accreditation assessment upon maturity of the programme;
- 8. For any programme to be eligible for part-time mode, it must have produced two (2) sets of graduates and satisfied the Resource Verification Requirements.
- 9. Commencement of a part-time programme MUST be subject to NUC's approval. Approval of commencement of all parttime programmes must be obtained.

The National Universities Commission shall not hesitate to apply appropriate sanctions on any university which violates any of the stipulated Guidelines on Part-Time and Sandwich Programmes.
